I like telling this story because it reminds me of who I am:

In 1905, Daisy Lowe was born a United States citizen in San Francisco's Chinatown. At age 18, a matchmaker introduced her to Sam Yee, a Chinese immigrant who came to America alone at age 16 with purchased papers to work and send money home. The oldest of seven children, he would see his family only once during the remaining years of his life. In 1924 Daisy married Sam and lost her U.S. citizenship due to the Chinese Exclusion Laws. Congress finally repealed these laws in 1944 but by then, the impact had already been felt. It was not until 1956, after studying for and passing an examination, that Daisy regained her lost citizenship.

In 1991, a small group of Chinese Americans living in the Tri-cities area formed Citizens for Better Community. They held their meetings in the living rooms of Henry & Maria Yin, Herb & Anita Chiu, Whisky & Wendy Ho, John & Rosa Wong, and others. Their mission: To be heard and to make this community a better place to live.

Despite the relatively recent unkind treatment received in this country of those that had been here before, the founding members understood the need to move forward for their children, grandchildren and generations to come. They had made this community their home.

As I look back at all the past presidents brought before us tonight--Dr. Herbert Chiu, Henry Yin, Dr. Albert Wang, Simon Chen, Steve Cho and Carl Chen, I am humbled. No doubt, I have large shoes to fill. Today, largely because of the efforts of these individuals and our founding members, CBC is alive and well. (Continued on page 2)

Issues and Politics...

Census 2000

The biggest news is that Fremont is now 37% Asian with a population of over 200,000 residents. Much has been said about this in the local and even national media. The New York Times on Friday, May 25th had the following to say: "The city is a vivid example of a shift in the landscape as Asian immigrants, particularly new arrivals with professional degrees and entrepreneurial ambitions, forsake urban enclaves and move to the suburbs in such numbers that they transform them. The new Fremonters include Silicon Valley engineers, entrepreneurs of every persuasion — from Sikhs owning 7-Eleven stores to Chinese chief executives living in Mediterranean palazzos — as well as Fijian Indians, Filipinos and one of the country's largest concentrations of Afghan refugees. The latest census figures disclose that the Asian population doubled since 1990 in this city of 206,000 people, to 37 percent from 19 percent."

Redistricting Time Again

Once every ten years, after the census, boundaries of districts may be re-drawn, with an intention of balancing out the population. This year the redistricting will occur with a mindset for the average population of an Assembly district of approximately 430,000. There have been many views expressed in this area. The East Bay Asian Voter Education Consortium, participating in a statewide effort led, promotes the keeping of ethnic Asians together as not to dilute their power by decreasing the number of Asia votes. Likewise, many members of the Coalition for Asian Pacific Americans for Fair Redistricting (CAPAFR) support the idea of keeping intact the communities of interest for racial or linguistic minorities together. The County will be holding a public hearing on redistricting in Fremont on June 18, 2001 at 7:00-8:30 p.m. in the City Council chambers. The Supervisor for the district will make a presentation, then the County Counsel will make a presentation on how redistricting works. They will take questions and comments from the audience at this meeting. Every city in the county could be affected by the redistricting, which is generally done once every 10 years after the census. The primary consideration is district size in terms of population. Ideally, each district should contain about 288,000 people. Other factors considered include topography, geography, compactness of the district, and community of interests. CBC encourages anyone interested to attend this upcoming public hearing on June 18th. Committee of 100 National Survey

A national survey sponsored by the Committee of 100 reflected interesting attitudes towards Chinese Americans. The poll reflected 25 percent of Americans

have "very negative attitudes" and 43 percent "somewhat negative attitudes" toward Chinese Americans. Twenty-three percent said they would be uncomfortable voting for an Asian American for president, compared with 15 percent who would be uncomfortable with an African-American president; 14 percent with a woman president; and 11 percent with a Jewish president. The Argus newspaper on April 25, 2001 reported on the results indicating that "The poll also tapped into some positive attitudes. The vast majority of those polled, 91 percent, said Chinese Americans have strong family values; 77 percent said they are as honest as other business people; and 68 percent said they are patriotic Americans."

The Argus interviewed CBC Director Chi Choy, which read as follows: "Some local Asian-American leaders said they were not surprised by the poll's findings. Chi Choy of Fremont said she was not surprised by people's attitudes, but even she was surprised by the number of people who hold anti-Asian sentiments. A friend of hers who was born in the United States would be disappointed by the poll results, she said. "He went into the Army. He coaches the Boy Scouts and does a lot of community service," said Choy, who is also a member of Citizens for Better Community. "He is Asian-American, and he is definitely a U.S. citizen, an American."

Alice Lai-Bitker Fundraiser
