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


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President's Message

CBC Youth Group Update

The CBC Youth Group is formed by a group of parents (mostly mothers) who are very caring and concerned about building character in their teenagers. Lecturing teenagers are not an effective means of communication, so we do fun and educational activities instead. Here are a couple of them:

Homeless shelter service

At the Tri-city homeless shelter, the youths cook and serve lunch or dinner to the homeless. The parents do the purchasing of the ingredients and the teenagers prepare, cook and serve the food. The teens also clean up. Everything is done under the supervision of the parents.

The Youth Group's 2007 schedule to feed the homeless are:

Saturday, March 31 ~ dinner Saturday, June 30 ~ dinner Sunday, July 22 ~ lunch Sunday, September 23 ~ lunch Sunday, September 30 ~ dinner

The approximate hours worked for dinner is from 4 p.m. to about 7 p.m. and lunch is from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

At the end of the service, the teenagers are provided with community service certificates; this is one of the requirements for high school graduation.

The feed back from teenagers is that it's fun and they feel good that the time spent is well worth it.

Toastmaster Youth Leadership Program

The Toastmaster Youth Leadership Program is designed to develop the speaking and leadership skills for young people to be better prepared to meet the demands and challenges of today's world. This program is an eight-week summer program that meets on Saturday mornings from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m.

The high school students have an enjoyable time learning some essential communication skills. It is a place for them to practice public speaking about topics that are common amongst teenagers. Once the student completes the Toastmaster requirements, a certificate will be rewarded at graduation. The graduation ceremony party gives students a chance to practice a true public speech and follow up with a warm lunch party.

A Toastmaster International Club, such as Star Search Toastmaster and CBC Toastmaster Club, sponsors this program. The toastmaster club provides teachers and teaching material. The CBC Youth Group provides volunteers (parents) to find a location to hold the program, sends out flyers, handles registration, purchases snacks and drinks, and plans the graduation ceremony.

Phonological Generalization

Have you ever-experienced difficulty understanding English spoken by your colleagues, friends, customers, or shop-clerks that are from other countries, just like many of us? Well, it should not come as a surprise to anyone who knows that there are more than 100 languages spoken in homes of Fremont alone. While we all speak different languages and dialects at home, most of us communicate in English while at work or while shopping. If you are one of the large groups of population who migrated to the United States from a non-English speaking country, becoming proficient in English communication is probably one of your most important goals. There are two sides of this communication coin: On one side, it is about communicating effectively from us to the people. The other side of the coin is to receive communication from other people effectively in order to understand them.

While most of our focus tends to be on communicating from us to the others, receiving communication effectively is often overlooked. Today we are going to discuss a key aspect of receiving communication: Understanding of language accents and simple ways to deal with it.

As mentioned earlier, there are more than one hundred languages spoken in the homes of Fremont, but everyone speaks English when they go out to work, shop or go to school. This generates tremendous varieties of the way English is spoken in this city. When I came to the United States, I had difficulty understanding some pronunciations of American people. For example, I found it difficult to differentiate between (Bob & Bop), (And & An), (Bag & Back) spoken by a native English speaker. They differ significantly from the way I was taught to pronounce them in India, where I learned English with British influence. This brings up the often mentioned, and less understood subject of 'Language Accents.' While most people deal with the other people's English accents with intuition and sometimes luck, there is a branch of science dedicated to the study of language sounds, their distribution and patterns. A special topic within the science of Phonology is 'Phonological Generalizations', which studies various language accents and derives general rules that describe a speaker's accent.

Let us go through some scientific understanding of accent. Accent is simply variability in stress, tone and

length of spoken syllables. A key point to note here is that by definition, any accent is always relative to some other accent. Basically, characteristics of any language accent can be categorized into three categories.

- 1. Consonant change
 - ?? Example: p->b, s->z, r->l, l->r, th->s/z
- 2. Vowel change
 - ?? Raise, Shorten, or Lower
- 3. Syllable structure change
 - ?? Add vowel, Add/remove consonant

Scientific study of various accents of American English (remember: accent is always relative) from people around the world has been done and a set of changes common to numerous other language speakers has been established. The good news is that there are typically less than 5-6 characteristics from each of the above categories for any strong accent. An excellent website that had database of various language accent is http://accent.gmu.edu.

On top of the scientific understanding, there are a few simple and effective ways to deal with accents of other people we communicate with:

- 1. If you do not understand something, ask again. Guesses cost more than facts!
- 2. Do not rush the other person: A non-native English speaker, hears you in English, translates to his/her native language in their mind, comes to a response in his/her language and translates the response back to English. Obviously, this mental translation needs extra time.
- If you have to deal with a particular type of accent every day, learn about that particular accent characteristics and soon you can understand them like you are one of them.
