## Come to the Fremont July 4th Parade!

Plan now to see the Fremont July 4<sup>th</sup> parade! Even better, if you feel like being part of the parade this year, you are



welcome to come and march too. CBC will coordinate our members as well as those from several other local Chinese American organizations. We often hear Fremont citizens saying how much they look forward to seeing the Chinese Americans turn out. This year, Citizens for Better Community, CBC Toastmasters, South Bay Chinese Club, American Chinese School, Purple Lotus Buddhist School, Sun Kung Fu Academy, and Friends of Children with Special Needs are already planning to join the parade. Tri City Band Corps will be leading in front of us. Not only this, the California Youth Chinese Symphony will be joining us too. They plan to play American patriotic music on Chinese instruments!

Some people are not interested in parades. Some are crazy about them. As one who used to be more or less uninterested, I can personally tell you that once you are in the parade, you become 'electrified'.

To give you some background about the Fremont July 4<sup>th</sup> parades... this will be the eleventh year of our city's parade. It has become a custom for the parade to rotate to different districts in Fremont (Warm Springs, Centerville, Mission, Niles, Irvington, and North Fremont). This year the parade will be a little more than one mile long and will be held in Warm Springs. There are usually some 80 entries. including bands, drill and dance teams, floats, clowns, antique cars to name a few. The parade assembles on Mayten Way/Whitney Place and Warm Springs Blvd. It will go north on Warm Springs Blvd and end at Hackamore Lane (Warm Springs Elementary School). There will also be a postparade mini festival at the school. Although the parade takes place on Saturday, 10 a.m. and ends by 12 noon, those who participate in the parade usually need to assemble around 8:30 a.m. The theme this year is "Spirit of the Springs."

Please wear your purple T-shirt if you are a CBC member and have one. Otherwise, it will be great if you can wear red, white and blue. Members of other organizations joining CBC will wear their club T-shirts or uniforms too. CBC will provide flags for waving to all participants. Remember: Whenever possible, try to wear Red/White/Blue. This is the day we celebrate America's birthday!

## South Bay Chinese Service Club's Annual Scholarship Luncheon

This year the South Bay Chinese Service Club awarded \$10,000 in scholarships to graduating high school seniors of Chinese descent at our 40<sup>th</sup> annual SBCSC Scholarship Luncheon held on Saturday, April 25, 2009. SBCSC President Linette Young greeted the graduates and praised them for their outstanding academic records and participation in community activities. Each applicant was introduced and presented with certificates of recognition from Congressman Pete Stark, Senator Ellen Corbett, Assemblyman Alberto Torrico and Alameda County Supervisor Scott Haggerty.

Our speakers were State Senator Leland Yee and former Scholarship recipient Sandy Liao. Both speakers shared their career experiences. They advised the students to pursue their dreams, challenge themselves, work hard and dare to step out of their comfort zones. They encouraged them to pursue their dreams, choose their experiences wisely and strive to keep their integrity. Both presentations were very well received by the students, their parents, club members, donors and local dignitaries.

The 34 applicants represented 5 different high schools in the Tri-City area. They are an impressive group of scholars. Their average GPA is 3.705 and together they have donated over 8,874 community service hours. In this group, there are 10 National Merit Finalists, 16AP Scholars, and 3 students with perfect unweighted 4.0 GPA's. The students are also officers and members of a number of school clubs and in student government.



## Alzheimer's Program In Mandarin

(father-in-law of Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger) had one thing in common. They all had Alzheimer's, a progressive and fatal brain disease. It has no current cure, and is the seventh-leading cause of death.

There is an accelerating worldwide effort under way to find better ways to treat the disease, delay its onset, or prevent it from developing. In its effort to provide public health information to the community, CBC cosponsored an Alzheimer's program in Mandarin Chinese at the Fremont Main Library on May 18, 2009.

Peining Chang from the Alzheimer's Association; and George Lin, an Alzheimer patient care-taker, gave an informative and moving presentation. Many in the audience kept both presenters in the library meeting room long after the program in order to get more information and answers.

Alzheimer's disease is a brain disorder named for German physician Alois Alzheimer, who first described it in 1906. This disease destroys brain cells, causing problems with memory, thinking and behavior severe enough to affect work, lifelong hobbies or social life. It is the most common form of dementia, a general term for the loss of memory and other intellectual abilities serious enough to interfere with daily life. Alzheimer's disease accounts for 50 to 70 percent of dementia cases.

Risk factors include age, family history, genetics, head injury, head-neck connection, and depression. The risk of developing Alzheimer's or vascular dementia appears to be increased by many conditions that damage the heart or blood vessels. These include high blood pressure, heart disease, stroke, diabetes and high cholesterol.

There are ten warning signs. 1. Memory changes that disrupt daily life. 2. Challenges in planning or solving problems. 3. Difficulty completing familiar tasks at home, at work or at leisure. 4. Confusion with time or place. 5. Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships. 6. New problems with words in speaking or writing. 7. Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps. 8. Decreased or poor judgment. 9. Withdrawal from work or social activities. 10. Changes in mood and personality.

Taking good care of our health, early detection, getting the best possible care that includes financial and legal advices, learning from others, using social services network, supporting those who have Alzheimer's were the important points given at the program.

George Lin gave a vivid account as a care taker of his mother who went through the three major stages of the disease. He quitted his job in Taiwan to come here to take care of his mother recently. In addition to taking English-as-a-Second-Language classes, he has learned to network with the Alzheimer's Association and various social services agencies. He told touching stories of the difficulties in taking care of an Alzheimer's patient, including the night duties when his wife would sleep with the mother-in-law in order to give the patient proper care.

The direct and indirect costs of Alzheimer's and other dementias to Medicare, Medicaid and businesses amount to more than \$148 billion each year. It is both a health care concern and a public policy concern.

The audience was comfortable and appreciative in receiving Alzheimer's information in Chinese and to ask detail questions in their native language. Peining Chang was thankful of CBC's support to help Alzheimer Association outreach to Alameda County's Chinese community. She left several PowerPoint handouts (in Chinese) with me. ## Chinese Medicine Health Evaluation a Success

On March 28, 2009, a sunny Saturday afternoon, the highly anticipated Chinese Medicine Free Clinic was held in the Fukaya Room at the Fremont Main Library. People in the community came with questions about their health or the health of their loved ones. This event is part of the annual Chinese Medicine Day celebration for many years. Fremont Main library, Citizens for Better Community (CBC), and United California Practitioners of Chinese Medicine (UCPCM) are the organizers and sponsors of this annual event for the past four years. Its purpose is to introduce Chinese Medicine to our community.

UCPCM is also sponsoring similar events going on in other regions of the Bay Area every year in March. UCPCM is a non-profit professional organization formed since 1995 with Traditional Chinese Medicine practitioners mainly from Northern California. It has become one of the largest and influential professional associations for Chinese Medicine. It always enjoys and appreciates the opportunity to partner up with other community organizations to serve the community.

Although Chinese Medicine has been around for over 2,000 years, it's recognized by the Western world only in the recent decades. Chinese Medicine includes modalities such as acupuncture, tui-na (a form of massage therapy), herbs and other therapies. More and more people realize the benefits of Chinese Medicine and are seeking treatments through it. By doing this event, the community can understand it better and can get first hand information.



This year, the event invited Dr. Lillian Huang, an acupuncturist and a Doctor in Oriental Medicine, to introduce how Chinese Medicine sees Depression and how it might help it. Dr. Erleen Chiang, an acupuncturist and a Qi Gong Master, introduced Dayan Qi Gong and some basic movements to many enthusiastic participants. Participants were very excited about both topics and the information presented was very valuable. At the same time, about a dozen Chinese Medicine Practitioners were there to give free consultation, advices and some treatments (without needles) to many attendees. Members of CBC were there to help with the logistics.

Thanks to all the volunteers, the event was thought to be successful. Hopefully, we will continue this tradition and bring this service to more people in the community for many years to come.
