



A Chinese American WWII Veteran

I have always known that my Uncle Joe (older brother of my mother) had served in the U.S. Military, but I was too young to absorb and follow the story. My Uncle had passed on, but with this project "Our Greatest Generation: A Salute to Chinese American WWII Veterans" being brought up, I couldn't help but to pursue the story with my cousin. I was fascinated by what my cousin told me. The story has become personal to me, at times, emotional. He was barely 18 when he first arrived in America. I could not imagine the struggle and hardship for a young man his age to have to establish himself on his own in a foreign land. Yet, his story was not uncommon among the early Chinese American immigrants. My uncles from my father's side of the family have similar stories. I was happy to learn that the "forgotten" service by the Chinese-American World War II Veterans will be recognized. I boldly take this occasion to share my Uncle's story and I salute his and all his fellow Veterans most respectfully.

As told and written by my cousin:

My Father came to America as a "paper son". Our Grand Uncle (grandfather's youngest brother) who was established in Boston secured "paper son" credentials for my Father......our boys' name have Wong as our middle name as a reminder of our true family name.....



My Father told me that these paper son papers were very valuable (expensive to buy) and were the golden ticket to get to America

Because US Immigration knew the existence of these paper sons, they questioned rigorously all Chinese coming through at Ellis Island (and Angel Island) to ensure that they were who they claim they were. My Father had to memorize all sorts of "facts" of this fictitious "Chin" to get through Immigration. He told me that there was time that

he forgot some facts and the person who was questioning him must have felt sorry for him and told him to take a smoke break to collect his thoughts/"facts." He must have passed. Anyway, the experience at Ellis Island was painful...he spent almost two (2) months on Ellis Island, not knowing if he would be allowed to stay or be deported. Of course there was the language barrier...he didn't speak any English.

Route to America:

He left Hong Kong on 25 December 1937 (18 years old) on the Empress of Canada to Vancouver. He took a train from there to Montreal, then to St Johns, Nova Scotia. He told me that on a particular railroad stop in Canada (he/they were under supervision), there was a Chinese vendor who was selling Chinese food to homesick travelers like him. He said that he was so happy to eat something so familiar to him after weeks of traveling.

Many years ago, when my Father and Mother were visiting me, I had offered to take them to Ellis Island, hoping that he could point out where he was detained. He flatly refused...it became apparent to me that the place brought bad memories to him. I never brought it up to him again.

One interesting note - "....Chinese were deemed to be "white"...."

The picture shown was taken of Company "H", 101st Medical Regiment, USA, Camp Edwards, Falmouth, Mass. 1941. My Uncle is 3rd on the right on the lower standing row. My cousin also pointed out that there were "No Afro-Americans!" During WW I and WWII, the US Army was segregated. Whites and Blacks served in their own units. You can infer from the picture that the Chinese were deemed to be "white" and served with white soldiers during WWII! My Father had mentioned that the other Asian in the picture (upper standing row) had died in an accident while serving in the Army.

Lastly, the picture of the young soldier was of my Uncle. A picture that gives his family pride. It is also a precious reminder that he had what it takes to be a true American! Bravo!



The South Bay Chinese Service Club Scholarship Program is entering into its 50th year of awarding scholarships to exemplary high school students of Chinese descent in our local community. Children of club members and students residing in Fremont, Newark, and Union City are eligible to apply. The purpose of the scholarship program is to recognize these talented students for their hard work and achievements, and to provide encouragement for the challenges ahead. The applicants are carefully evaluated based on academic achievement, leadership, community service, financial need and extracurricular achievement.

The scholarship application form is available online at www.SouthBayChineseClub.org and as of January 10, 2020, we have already received 41 requests for applications. We are continuing to improve the scholarship application process to make it easier for our applicants. Please check our website within the next two months if your students or your friends and neighbor's students are interested in applying for this scholarship. Last year with generous donations from many of our members and sponsors such as Fremont Bank, Republic Services, Dutra Enterprises, and Citizens for Better Community, we awarded a total of \$25,500 in scholarship awards to 21 students. Celebrate the 140th Bok Kai Festival

The Bok Kai parade's rich history is believed to have started as far back as the 1850's. Always held on the weekend closest to the second day of the second month of the Lunar calendar, it is the longest continually held parade in California.



The parade honors Bok Eye, the Chinese Water God, who protects Marysville from flooding. (Parade to be held on Saturday, February 22 from 11 a.m. – 1 p.m.)

The parade features community organizations, schools, businesses, traditional Chinese lion dancers, lots of fire crackers and the famous 175-foot-long golden dragon named "Hong Wan Lung." Dragons play a big part in the Chinese culture as well as in the Bok Kai parade's history.
