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President's Message

Dear CBC Members and Friends,

He continued walking and saw the third worker. He asked, "What are you doing?" The worker said, "I am building an elementary school for 800 students. You see, there's the MPR, there's the playground..... It is going to be a beautiful campus! The kids are really going to have a great learning experience here."

From this little illustration, we can see how a person's attitude matters. How one looks at his/her circumstances in life affects how he/she applies him/herself. It may be the same task for all three of the construction workers, but their attitude toward their task is very different.

For the first worker, he is just doing a chore. There is no fun, no joy, and no dream.

For the second worker, he has a better idea as to what he is doing, and he applies himself more purposefully.

However, for the last worker, he has a great passion and vision. He is not just doing a job that brings him money, or gaining an experience that applies to his resume; he is truly enjoying the process and making sure that the school kids will benefit from the fruit of his labor.

By sharing this message with the students, I hope they will also have a positive attitude toward their experience at the CBC Toastmasters Youth Leadership Program. I hope they are not just attending the sessions as an obligation or for the purpose of making their college application portfolio look good; but doing it with a sense of joy and desire to develop their public speaking skills. This way, not only will they be able to enjoy the process, gain a skill and build confidence, they will also be able to use this experience to serve the community and help other people.

It is so important to have a good learning attitude. With a mindset which is not afraid of asking tough questions, searching for viable solutions, exploring new ideas, or taking on challenging tasks in life, learning will be fun, exciting, fulfilling and invigorating!

Lessons can be picked up everywhere in our daily life - through interaction with others, handling of family/personal/social/community affairs, operation of business and organizational matters, etc. Further, we have a responsibility to serve as good role models for the younger generations.

Mount Jade is the tallest mountain in Taiwan and there are aboriginal people still with their traditional custom and way of living. The story of Taiwanese aboriginals is similar to indigenous communities throughout the world. The once proud and glorious communities now harbor strong feelings of inferiority, hopelessness, and apathy which create a vicious cycle of poverty.

Vox Nativa believes that instilling confidence within the youngest generation is the key to breaking the vicious cycle and the key to social reform. Bukut Tasvaluan, a principal of one of the elementary schools in the XinYi Township of Jade Mountain, is a strong advocate for this type of social reform. Vox Nativa musical school provided the opportunity for the under-privileged kids to build their self-esteem and the opportunity for higher education. In return, they will contribute back and help their community after they finish their higher education.

Wisdom Culture and Education Organization (WCEO) is the key sponsor for the choir's U.S. visit and its USA Inaugural Concert on July 6, 2013, at the Jubilee Christian Center in Silicon Valley. It was a sold out event and the concert was a great success with their beautiful voices and amazing songs and its traditional ceremonies.

Prior to the concert on July 6, with the help of our board member Steve Cho, Vox Nativa Children's Choir participated in the 4th of July Parade in Fremont with CBC as they kicked off the parade with their beautiful voices singing America's National Anthem.

Both contests provide a fun way to practice, learn and improve communication skills. This event will be an excellent opportunity to see accomplished, compelling speakers provide a Saturday morning of free entertainment.
