Membership and placement is by audition. Weekly rehearsals are on Monday from 4:00 pm to 7:00 pm starting from September 12, 2016. The rehearsal location is Cole Hall of the First United Methodist Church, 2950 Washington Blvd. in Fremont.

In the tradition of upholding the excellence of classical music in our community, the Fremont Symphony

Orchestra (FSO) is proud to have nurtured thousands of impressively talented young musicians with programs such as the Children's Concerts, the Young Recitalist Competitions, and the Young Artist Competitions. Original winning compositions by Fremont schoolchildren are professionally arranged and performed by FSO at the Children's Concerts. Likewise, Competition winners are awarded with performance opportunities. To further serve the many young talented musicians in the Tri-City and the greater Bay Area, FSO is excited to announce the launching of the all new Fremont Youth Symphony Orchestra in September 2016.

Under the auspice of FSO, the Fremont Youth Symphony Orchestra (FYSO) provides an encouraging and motivating environment for young musicians to receive quality training and pursue performance excellence through high-quality instruction and mentorship by professional musicians. Through a variety of performance opportunities, FYSO seeks to empower young musicians to actively engage in preserving and promoting the performing arts in our community.

Program Overview

FYSO is comprised of two initial ensembles -- Intermediate and Advanced -- tailored to specific skill levels and open to sixth- through twelfth-graders. Students will receive individualized support from the directors and sectional coaches. The quality training will help students develop strong musicianship and performance technique for orchestral playing.

Toastmasters Youth Leadership Program

The Toastmasters Youth Leadership Program (YLP) has completed another successful year!

Special congratulations to the Graduation Showcase winners: Yang Yi Li – 11th grade (Best Speech), Halina Liang – 10th grade (Best Table Topic), and Michelle Lin – 10th grade (Best Evaluation).

The CBC YLP is based on Toastmasters' curriculum and recreates the Toastmaster experience for our students. Over the course of only five weeks (June 18th – July 23rd), the students have learned public speaking skills (ranging from Speech Organization to Body Language), completed officer elections, delivered two planned speeches, provided feedback to peers, conducted Toastmasters meetings, and participated in various speaking roles (including impromptu speaking), all under the guidance of our outstanding coaches. On the final day, the Program Showcase allowed both the students to demonstrate what they have learned and the parents to witness how much their children have grown.

Public speaking and leadership skills are invaluable assets for any person (both now and for the future). High school students, in particular, can benefit from these skills because the knowledge is directly applicable to their needs. Whether speaking in front of a class of peers or tackling a job/college interview, these skills will be beneficial. Our students come to the YLP with different personalities and backgrounds. Some students have experience speaking in front of other while others are terrified of public speaking. Despite these differences, the YLP offers something for everyone—perhaps your child could benefit from developing his/her



speaking skills and receiving feedback from peers, or perhaps your child could strengthen his/her innervoice through building self-confidence in speaking. What unifies the students is a sense of camaraderie that comes from understanding: "At one point or another, we have all had to face challenges. Helping peers and friends overcome challenges makes learning worthwhile." When a student stumbled during his speech, it was heartwarming to see his peers cheer for and encourage him. At the end of the program, seeing how much the students have improved was rewarding—knowing that we did it together. By leveraging the differences (in experience, perspective, goals, styles, etc.), CBC's Youth Leadership Program created a diverse and supportive learning environment that was key to the success of its students.

None of this success would be possible without the support and efforts of all volunteers. Walk of Remembrance: Celebrating Pacific Grove's Chinese Village and Pioneering Fishing Community

On May 14th, CBC and SBCC Members Steve & Amy Cho, Joe & Cecilia Zerda, and SBCC members Gene & Mary K. Lim joined Randy & I in the 7th Annual Walk of Remembrance which began at the Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History and ended at the Chinese Fishing Village site where my Grandfather was born in 1881. This walk was created to remember and honor the lives of the area's early Chinese-American settlers. I appreciate the time and support that both CBC and SBCC members took to come to Pacific Grove and walk with my extended family, other Chinese village descendants, local community members, local organizations, tourists, and friends to help educate about a little known Chinese Fishing Village that burned down "mysteriously" on May 16, 1906.

The Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History, the Heritage Society of Pacific Grove, The City of Pacific Grove, the National Coalition Building Institute -Monterey Chapter, The Monterey Bay Lion Dance Team, The American Civil Liberties Union - Monterrey Chapter, have been so supportive over the years. They have joined to help in any way they can to create the walk. The caring and kind efforts of all the people who have come to this event over time give me HOPE. They have helped me to see that, even though it seemed impossible, we could persevere and strive for "CHANGE." Change is possible!!! It takes Understanding, Help, Alliances, Courage, Action, and Friendships. Thank You to All Participating Groups for your Friendships in Memory of Pacific Grove's once little-known Chinese Village and its early pioneering Chinese Fishing Families! Thank You CBC and SBCC Members!

Through events such as this, we are able to reclaim and preserve actual local Chinese American stories. This allows descendants and the community to explore our ancestor's experiences and learn about the courage, the tenacity, and the perseverance of revered ancestors and of their descendants and how we have found meaning, place and success in our world. It helps us to appreciate the life and sacrifice that our ancestors chose to come to America to find a better life for their families. They would be proud to know about our Walk of Remembrance led by the Monterey Bay Chinese Lion Dance Team. The Magnificent Lions, Drums, Gong, and Cymbals serve to awaken the Ancestor's stories and to let the Ancestor's know that "We Remember!" and We Bring Our Great Gratitude to them for sailing across the Pacific Ocean in their Chinese Junks and for enduring hardships and adversities. Their resolve and their perseverance have made us Strong and generations later.....We Are Thankful and We Remember!
